Your Church, Your Gift

The PCC has written a Legacy Policy confirming that any gift, no matter how large or small, will be used to make a lasting difference.

Our Legacy Policy

Suggested wording for your will:

“I give ____% of my residuary estate
OR I give the sum of £____ (pounds only) free of all taxes to the Parochial Church Council of the Ecclesiastical Parish of _____ in the Diocese of _____ for its general purposes, and I declare that the receipt of an officer of the Parochial Church Council shall be a sufficient discharge to my executors and trustees.”
